Legion d'honour Presentation 6th June 2016

On the 72nd anniversary of D Day, Major Will Meddings of B (Suffolk) Company presented the Legion d'honneur to Bill Brownsell, Bill landed with the Second Wave on Queen White sector, at Sword Beach at 0825 6th June 1944 with the 1st Bn Suffolk Regiment, part of 3rd Infantry Division. He continued to take part in the beachhead fighting until being wounded, and finally evacuated back to England three weeks later. The medal presentation took place at the Boot Inn, Sarratt, Hertfordshire with many members of Bill's family present.



Starting with the arrival at the FOB, all troops were keen and ready to get stuck into the Fighting in Woods and Forests (FIWAF) phase, which was seen throughout the weekend by all ranks. No matter how wet, cold, tired or hungry, soldiers kept on fighting the good fight. It was impressive (due to the huge turnout) to see multiple platoon strength formations advancing on woodblocks, where all knew a well dug in enemy was lurking. As soon as the first crack of rifle fire was heard, the quiet wood block became a storm of rifle fire with men advancing quickly onto the enemy positions dispersed within. I found it interesting to see how different people coped with the different and never ending challenges of FIWAF. Poor visibility, difficulty to maintain communications, fatigue and struggling to keep formations/momentum. Rather than quitting and giving up, they made it happen, with team work, high levels of grit and good skills.

This exercise was an intense one, but it was worth the combined efforts of all taken part with operations running late into the very wet Saturday night/ Sunday morning. Very little sleep was had by all and the big push on the Sunday was done with everyone giving 100%, this must have been seen by the CO who allowed a small respite by calling off the Roberts cup event.

Association News

Centenary of Swiss Care of British POWs at Chateau D'Oex, Switzerland

On 30th May 2016 the first train carrying severely wounded British POWs arrived at Chateaux D'Oex after an inter-government agreement. Famously the arrival into Swiss care under the Red Cross was described as going "From Hell to Heaven". The Times of 30 May 1916 lists the 27 seriously wounded officers on the first train and included two from our forebear Regiments: Capt. Ernest Orford, Suffolk Regt and Lieut J.W. Reynolds, 8th Lincolns.

As a small part of preparation for the commemoration RHQ and the curators of the Suffolk Regiment and Royal Lincolnshire Regiment museums researched the two officers and were able to provide the organisers with some detail, which added colour to the commemoration of the Swiss care of our wounded POWs.



Capt Ernest Orford was OC C Coy, 2nd Bn and was severely wounded and captured at Le Chateau on 24 Aug 14. In May 16 the Regimental Gazette was able to reports on the care he received at Chateau D'Oex: "We are glad to hear that his wound, which has been open for twenty two months, has already begun to heal" The research also produced photographs of Ernest Orford as a POW in Magdeburg and details of his recovery and life after the war.

Lieut. J.W. Reynolds was very severely wounded and captured after fighting his way up Hill 70 near Loos on 27 Sep 15. The extent of his injuries was detailed in his confidential interview now held in the National Archives. Lieut Reynolds's initial injuries resulted in the loss of his right arm, later a shell severely damaged his ribs and after spending the night on the battlefield untended, he was shot through the hand and a piece of shell passed through his foot before he was eventually found and evacuated. That Lieut. J.W. Reynolds recovered is also a testament to his care at Chateau D'Oex. The research also produced a photograph of Lieut JW Reynolds among his fellow Officers in the 8th Battalion.

The Regt sent the message below and a bouquet: "The Royal Anglian Regiment would like to offer its heartfelt thanks for the great kindness afforded to our wounded soldiers by the good people of Chateau d'Oex and by all the Swiss nation. From our forebear Regiments, in particular Capt Ernest Orford of the then Suffolk Regiment and Lieut J W Reynolds of the then Lincolnshire Regiment who were two of those welcomed by you from the very first train on 30th May 1916, exactly 100 years ago today – please accept

this bouquet as a modest token of our deep gratitude on behalf of our soldiers who were made most welcome here and given the chance to convalesce and recover in peace. The commemoration was attended by our current Ambassador to Switzerland, Sir David Moran. The photo below shows his predecessor, Evelyn Grant Duff addressing the POWs at Chateaux D'Oex in 1916,

In 1916 this was a symbolic event of national significance. The Times reported that over 10,000 people dressed in their Sunday best were at the railway station at Lausanne at 5 in the morning when the train stopped for refreshments.
