The Regiment Bids a Fond Farewell to Major Adrian ('Adey') Penn on his Retirement From the Army After Almost 39 years of Dedicated Service.

Adey completed his initial training at Bassingbourn in 1984 before joining the 3rd Battalion ('The

Pompadours') in West Germany. After training in Canada, he deployed on his first tour of Northern Ireland, to North Belfast, in 1986-7. By 1989, he had completed both a PNCO Cadre and SCBC, finishing the latter with a distinction, and promoted to Corporal.

After a stint in the Falkland Islands, he undertook training as part of the Close Observation Platoon, and deployed on his second tour of Northern Ireland, this time to Londonderry. In 1992, he took part in parades marking the amalgamation of 'The Pompadours' into the 1st and 2nd Battalions of the newly structured Royal Anglian Regiment. Adey then moved to Germany to join the 2nd Battalion in Celle before completing PSBC. Having promoted to Sergeant, he enjoyed an enormously successful spell as the youngest ever recruiting sergeant at Leicester's AFCO.

In 1996, Adey returned to the Poachers as a Platoon Sergeant before promotion to Colour Sergeant and a posting to the Infantry Training Centre (Catterick). In 2000, he returned to the Poachers on promotion to WO2 as the Milan Platoon 2IC; despite no prior training on Milan, he received a distinction and 'Instructor



Recommendation' on the Milan Platoon Commanders' Course. Thereafter, he spent two years as Company Sergeant Major of C (Northamptonshire) Company and a further two years as RQMS (Maint), which included moving the 2nd Battalion out to Ballykelly in Northern Ireland.

Upon selection to WOI, he enjoyed three hugely successful posts: Chilwell Station RSM, RSM 3 R ANGLIAN ('The Steelbacks') and the Command Sergeant Major at the Combined Training and Advisory Group, Kabul. In 2009, he successfully commissioned as a Late Entry Officer and joined the 1st Battalion ('The Vikings') in Pirbright as the RCMO. Adey's following LE appointments included MTO and QM (Tech) in the Poachers. During the latter, he was awarded a Commander Land Forces Commendation for his work in the United Kingdom Support Detachment.

From 2014-18, Adey served as the Poachers' QM and OC Headquarter Company, initially in Cottesmore and then in Dhekelia. A big fan of service in Cyprus, he took on the role of OC Dhekelia Station – a post tied to the Queen's Division – from 2018-21. The Vikings' move to Dhekelia in 2021 slotted in neatly with the end of his time in this role, and offered him the chance to become OC Headquarter Company in the Ist Battalion for a year. In December 2022, he handed over the role before spending his last six months in the UK.

The Colonel of the Regiment and All Ranks wish Adey and his wife Alison a happy and fruitful retirement, and we look forward to seeing them both at future regimental events.

Our Affiliated Cadets



For the first time in the history of the Army Cadet Force a National ACF Museum has been created at Octavia Hill's Birthplace House in Wisbech, Cambridgeshire. So it was fitting the Cadets from the local Wisbech Detachment, Cambridgeshire ACF would be the first Cadets to visit.



The ACF Museum is being created as a project in conjunction with ACCTA, Regional Command along Col (Retd) Mark Knight MBE DL., a former Commandant of Cambridgeshire ACF,

The idea is to bring together memorabilia covering the start of the ACF in 1859, Octavia Hill's involvement from 1889 in the formation of the modern day ACF as we know it today right up to year 2023. The present conception of the Army Cadet Force as a voluntary youth organisation, helped and inspired by the Army, really stems from that time and has continued throughout the ACF's. Octavia is well known for her work as a founder of the National Trust, social reformer but not generally for her pioneering work with the ACF.

Although many ACF items are in circulation with private individuals it is hoped to secure donations or loans of items for display in the ACF Museum. It is a major task and relies on the support of ACF members and former cadets who have served.



The Museum is now open where ACF members will be most welcomed, maybe when training on nearby STANTA.

For those unable to visit it is planned to create a virtual tour and website downloads are planned. Its a start! A quote from one of the Cadets reads "I knew a little about the ACF History but seeing the Museum has been a great experience"

Remembering 2Lt Nick Hull - Killed in Action, Belfast 16 April 1972

We also have spent some time clearing the past donations and properly conserving them, cataloguing them, and adding them to the collection.



Our Regimental Heritage



The Battle of Almanza - By Peter Ferrary

Earlier this year Mike Meredith and I visited Almansa * in South East Spain, at the invitation of the town, to participate in its 315th anniversary celebrations of the battle. Our aim was to explain our Regiment's participation in the battle and our continuing commemoration of an event which most Spaniards, until very recently, had long forgotten.



These celebrations in Almansa are a relatively recent innovation, instigated and driven forward, in particular for the 300th anniversary, by a keen local historian, one Herminio Gomez, who has been tireless in promoting this long forgotten battle among historians, academics, his local townspeople and, importantly, the municipality. The battle had wide ranging geopolitical consequences in so far as Spain was concerned. Herminio has succeeded in having a small local museum established dedicated to the battle and in organising guided battlefield tours, annual reenactments of the battle, as well as a seminar over the course of a long weekend close to the 25th April. These re-enactments now attract about 400 appropriately costumed participants from far and wide and the whole event has now become a major regional attraction. As Herminio confesses, what had started as a hobby has now become his full time job and vocation.

The idea for the visit arose as a result of the late Michael Goldschmidt's initiative in early 2017 to organise a Wessex Vikings Almanza Luncheon. This proved very successful and 16 of us gathered to enjoy the event. Many contacts were re-established and in my case I re-connected with Mike whom I hadn't seen in some years.

Mike's wife Pilar is Spanish and they often holiday near Alicante not that far from Almansa. So on their next visit following the 2017 luncheon, Mike and Pilar visited Almansa expressly to visit the Battle of Almansa Museum which Mike had researched. Herminio, on learning that a former Royal Anglian, with links to the 9th of Foot, was at the Museum's doors, greeted him with the words, "Hola, Holy Boy!" (the much later nickname of the 9th of Foot) and proceeded to tell him about Steuart's Regiment (the forbear regiment of the 9th) and show him where its place was in the Order of Battle on a large plan of the battlefield!



A friendship was struck and subsequently, in 2019, Mike returned to Almansa and presented a delighted Herminio with a photograph of "Almanza 1707" embroidered on the 1st Battalion's Drum Major's sash for display in his museum; tangible evidence of our Regiment's association with Almansa which Herminio had asked about. The idea then developed as to the possibility of finding a willing person who could present a talk in Spanish about the Regiment and its connection with this significant event in Spanish history, the Battle of Almansa, at the following year's commemorative events. Mike thought of myself and rather too enthusiastically I agreed! The idea for a future visit was born.

But giving a presentation in Spanish was easier said than done. Whilst my Spanish is fluent it is unpractised beyond a domestic level. So having completed the relatively easy part of preparing a presentation in English, a significant effort in translation was required! It was, after all, 40 years since I had attended the Spanish Army Staff College.

Our visit was to have taken place in April 2020 but Covid intervened and it was not until this year that we were able to go. Though we had to make our own way there (Mike from UK myself from Gibraltar), the municipality paid for our accommodation in the best 4-star hotel in town and we were very well looked after during our 3 day visit. The proprietor of the Hotel Blu where we stayed was also great fun and very hospitable and ensured our stay was most comfortable and enjoyable.

It is fair to say that Mike and I, initially, had only a sketchy idea of the programme of events other than the requirement to give our presentation. However, as well as the seminar and two battle re-enactments being staged on Saturday and Sunday, the weekend also coincided with the twinning ceremony between Almansa

and the Italian town of Volvera and the visit of an Italian delegation for the occasion. In part, we were swept up in these events and on the Friday morning after being shown round Almansa by the Deputy Mayor we visited a bodega where the Italian delegation were being treated to some local wines. That evening, at the official start of the seminar Mike presented the town's mayor with a Regimental plaque which was much appreciated. Detachments of re-enactors paraded through the streets adding to a general festive atmosphere about the town. There was local TV interest in all these goings on which unbeknown to us included Mike and I. It was only on return to our hotel on our second evening that the receptionist greeted us with "I saw you on TV earlier"!

The presentation on Saturday morning, delivered to an audience of about 30 – mainly academics and local military history buffs – went very well. There was little to say on the actual battle other than presenting the facts as we know them and given in our Special Order of the Day: despite the Allied defeat, Steuart's Regiment, later the 9th of Foot etc, distinguished themselves in the battle and, as tradition has it, were rewarded by Queen Anne with the privilege of adopting Britannia as the Regiment's insignia. (The system of awarding Battle Honours was only introduced much later in 1760 though Regiments were able to claim these retrospectively. The first battle honour awarded to the 9th was Belleisle, an island off the coast of Brittany captured by the British in 1761.

The presentation also covered the 9th's connections with Spain (Corunna/Holy Boys/Peninsular War), the development of the regimental system and our present day Regiment. The presentation was well supported with plenty of slides which were much appreciated. Two other speakers, academics from the universities of Alicante and Albacete, had also taken part the previous evening.

One spoke on the lasting effect that the aftermath of the battle had on legislative procedures by imposing a "Spain - one nation" policy on the Catalan regions. The other on the important and very significant financial aid there is available from the EU to support cultural, heritage and sports projects throughout the EU and of which Spain is a major recipient. This was evident in our tour of Almansa; a fairly small town boasting a large sports complex and with many of its old buildings lovingly restored.

On the Saturday afternoon Mike and I attended the first re-enactment which was impressive and enjoyable other than for the weather which was quite cold. Herminio, in his period costume, was the enthusiastic commentator for the event.

On Sunday morning, before the second re-enactment and in brighter, warmer weather, we were invited to partake in the Battle of Almansa remembrance proclamation involving speeches by the Mayor and other local dignitaries including the Italian Mayor. Following this and after the departure of the re-enactors to prepare for battle, Mike and I were surprised to find ourselves, escorting an elegant lady in period dress carrying our poppy wreath (on behalf the Regiment), at the head of the procession of dignitaries and including a band, through the streets of Almansa clapped enthusiastically by the locals.

On arrival at the ground where the re-enactment was taking place, Mike and I were the first to lay our wreath before the other dignitaries laid their own floral tributes. The original monument marking the site of the battle had been destroyed, rebuilt and destroyed several times over the years so what we had was a faithful reproduction of the original memorial which gets displayed every year during the celebrations and is then stored away. Vandals exist everywhere.

In sum, this was a very successful visit and has established our Regiment's continued commemoration of the Battle of Almansa firmly in the locals' minds and is now recorded in their museum. Mike had also

brought along a copy of the regimental history, From Aden to Afghanistan, a gift from RHQ on behalf of the Regiment, to be displayed in the Battle of Almansa museum.



Anyone visiting sunny Alicante may wish to visit Almansa. It is an interesting little place with a castle, dating from the period of the Muslim occupation of Spain, perched on a crag above the town and very beautifully restored. Almansa also produces an excellent wine though sadly this is not widely available in the UK.

As indicated earlier, the genesis for the Almansa trip stemmed from the Wessex Vikings Almanza lunches which were held in 2017-19. On this note it is hoped that an Almanza lunch will be held in 2023 – whether in Wessex or not – not only to continue this 'tradition' but as a tribute to Michael Goldschmidt's memory also.
