The exercise saw a progression through a number of mission sets including tasks such as advance to Contact, Deliberate Attacks, and Obstacle Crossings. The exercise went very well, impressing 4LBCT and 7LMBCT LOs alike. This small part of a larger deployment sees our footprint established on Ras Madrakah training area for more to follow.

### **Our Regimental Museum**

Starting with probably the biggest news, it is becoming clearer how the future redevelopment of the IWM is likely to affect our Regimental Museum. We were briefed on the original IWM Masterplan over ten years ago, so we have long known that our Museum Gallery was due to move to a new location. Our current Museum Gallery is in the Land Warfare Hall and this site is to be redeveloped, though we do not know exactly when this will happen.

The current forecast is for 2025. But as with many big redevelopment plans, dates have shifted to the right and delays have been compounded by the effects of COVID. Our Museum Trustees are currently working closely with the IWM Trustees, looking at options for new locations at Duxford.

Rather obviously in recent years our Museum Trustees have been cautious about undertaking major developments in our Museum Gallery while it has been about to move, so we are very excited at the prospect of a major project to design and build what will be a completely new museum. Subject to the design for the new space we would hope to be able to incorporate different displays and objects, more personal stories of officers and soldiers, and include more current conflicts and deployments which are not covered in our gallery now.




Visits from RANGLIAN Affiliated Cadet Units Have Increased Significantly - A Welcome Trend

I have been a cadet with Suffolk Army Cadet Force since January 2017 and have enjoyed all my years as a cadet.


