Great War - Rededication Ceremonies 20-23 June 2022

Captain Tom Wilde, Padre to the 2nd Battalion, and Lt Jack Rice also of the Poachers joined a party from The Rifles in France 20-23 June close to Arras and Amiens for the rededication of the graves of two of our Fallen.

Second Lieutenant Ernest Lockett Cole of the 8th Battalion, The Northamptonshire Regiment, Killed In Action (KIA) on 27 September 1916, was interred at Ovillers Military Cemetery, and Serjeant Ernest Edward Harris of the 10th Battalion, The Essex Regiment, KIA 8 August 1918, at Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery. Also it was good to see in attendance a fit and well Peter Williamson in his role as a Trustee of the Essex Museum.

Padre Tom conducted the services and commented:" It has been a huge honour to conduct the services of 2nd Lt Ernest Lockett Cole and Sgt Ernest Edward Harris. During the services I spoke about the importance of a name and how wonderful it is when the names of our unknown fallen are found. With finding a name the person is brought to life through their history, their story and their endeavours.



A family is often found which can bring even more life to the serviceman and we had the great privilege to have family members from both 2nd Lt Cole and Sgt Harris joining us. Their names now live on through their families".

Vikings Embark on a Comprehensive Summer Training Season



C (Essex) Company deployed to the Western Sovereign Base Area on their two-week Basic Combat Syllabus exercise. The exercise was split into two parts with week one being focused on fitness, navigation and range time with the new SA80 A3s developing individual close quarter marksmanship skills. The week also included presentation and lessons on jungle warfare, the Cambrian Patrol, and a historical perspective of urban operations from Stalingrad during the Second World War, to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

This first week set the conditions for the following week's urban focused operations in Paramali Village. The company deployed on Sunday night to platoon harbour areas and were thankfully bolstered by the arrival of a further 15 members who had been tasked elsewhere during the first week. The week started with a rotation of Section attack lane by night, Nav Exercise and a challenging medical battle exercise. By midweek sections had moved into the village to conduct section level room clearance drills led by the section commanders before putting them into practice with two challenging platoon level attacks at night.

The Exercise culminated in a platoon raid to seize enemy assets and a lengthy extraction to a pickup location under harassing enemy fire. Overall, the platoons were able to get some much-needed training time before the company deploys on Exercise Eager Lion in Jordan later this year.



1st Battalion Operational Shooting Team

The I RANGLIAN shooting team has had an excellent season culminating in competing in the Army Operational Shooting Competition (AOSC 22).

The I R ANGLIAN shooting team is made up of 7 soldiers and I officer predominantly from D (Cambridgeshire) Company. Prior to the season the team had varying levels of experience, some members have competed in Army shooting competitions before whereas for others this was a new venture. The team began the season training in preparation for the Cyprus Operational Shooting Competition (COSC). Once the team was happy with our points of aim at the various distances we then began training for the specific operational shoots, this included snap shooting at up to 600m and physically arduous shoots to replicate shooting conditions found on operations.

The battalion team competed in COSC, against 9 other teams on the island. The 2-day event culminated with a falling plate competition. I R ANGLIAN beat off, all other challengers, to comfortably win the Overall Competition and narrowly missed out on the falling plate coming 2nd in the final. Winning the COSC was a great achievement, the team came 1st or 2nd overall on every shoot. This victory earned the Shooting Team the opportunity to represent British Forces Cyprus at Bisley in the Army Operational Shooting Competition (AOSC 22).

The Army Operational Shooting Competition is a 3-day event held at Bisley ranges in Pirbright. It has been decades since the Battalion had last competed at the AOSC and the team was excited to have the opportunity. The event saw 35 teams take part from across the Army. There was a real difference in experience; some teams have competed in the AOSC every year since its inception.. Extremely high standards were set by the Royal Gurkha Rifles but the I RANGLIAN team shot well during the competition. Ultimately the I RANGLIAN team came 13th out of possible 35. Sadly, the team just missed out on finishing in the Army 100, which is the top 100 shots in the army. Cpl Westerman, and LCpl Fixe from Anti-Tank Platoon finished 112th and 119th respectively. Overall, the experience for all those that took part was extremely enjoyable and will be fondly remembered.

SALAMANCA DAY - 22 JULY 1812





The 44th and 56th of Foot, The Essex Regiment and the Battle of Salamanca

Following the French Revolution in 1789, Great Britain was at war with France for most of the period 1793-1815 as Napoleon Bonaparte, seizing power in 1799, attempted to dominate the whole of Europe. Much of the action was at sea, but the Peninsula War from 1808-1814, was the setting for the Army's major contribution to Napoleon's eventual defeat. For most of the time the British Forces in the Peninsula were under command of General Sir Arthur Wellesley, later to become the Duke of Wellington, and fought alongside Spanish and Portuguese allies.

On 22 July 1812 at Salamanca north-west of Madrid, Wellington's army, from a strong and well concealed defensive position, was able to launch a surprise attack on the flanks of the French forces. After repeated assaults the whole French Army was driven back in confusion, and the way was open for Wellington to advance on Madrid.

The 2nd Battalion of the 44th (East Essex) Regiment of Foot, which had been raised in 1803, played a significant part in the battle and Lieutenant William Pearce captured the Eagle Standard of the French 62nd Regiment of the Line. The 1st Battalion of the 9th (East Norfolk) Regiment, the 1st Battalion of the 48th (Northamptonshire) Regiment of Foot, and the 2nd Battalion of the 58th (Rutlandshire) Regiment of Footwear also involved in the action and, like the 2/44th, were granted the Battle Honour 'Salamanca'.


Subsequently, the 44th Foot, as the 1st Battalion of the Essex Regiment, adopted an eagle as their badge. The tradition was continued during further reorganisations so that today the Regimental Colour includes an eagle and all ranks of the Regiment wear an eagle badge on the upper left arm in formal dress. The anniversary of the battle itself is marked annually C (Essex) Company, 1st Battalion and C (Essex) Coy of the 3rd Battalion in Chelmsford.

TALAVERA DAY - 27 JULY 1809



48th and 58th of Foot, The Northamptonshire Regiment and the Battle of Talavera

Talavera was a battle of the Peninsular War. Wellington had advanced into Spain with the intention of bringing to battle a large French Army. On 27 July 1809 his forces occupied high ground at Talavera; south west of Madrid, alongside a large Spanish force. Late in the evening the French attacked, before the left of the British line was properly in position, and occupied an important hill. A swift counter attack, in which the 1st Battalion of the 48th (Northamptonshire) Regiment of Foot played a prominent part, drove the French off the hill, and other troops, including the 2nd Battalion of the 48th, came up to help secure the position.

A large scale French assault the following morning was repulsed, but later in the day when the French attacked the centre of the British line a dangerous gap was opened up. Wellington summoned the 1/48th to plug the gap, which they did with great dash and bravery. In his subsequent dispatch Wellington wrote, 'The battle was certainly saved by the advance position, and steady conduct of the 48th Regiment.'

Talavera Day was celebrated with the Northamptonshire Regiment and the 2nd East Anglian Regiment. Today it remains the the Regimental Day of the 2nd Battalion.
