

Poulters Prize 2023 Awarded to Pte Christopher Webb, 1st Battalion.



The Regiment warmly congratulates Private Christopher Webb for winning the Poulters Prize for 2023.

His nomination focused on his exemplary service in the Motor Transport Platoon, in the Headquarters Company of the 1st Battalion, Royal Anglian Regiment, particularly for his support to the Battalion's recent move from Cyprus, noting that the role in which he has excelled is usually filled by a substantive Corporal.

The prize is awarded each year to "the individual who has best promoted the ethos of The Royal Anglian regiment in a significant way." All Battalions submitted excellent nomination, which were scored by the Poulters and by our Deputy Colonels of the Regiment and our Senior Late Entry Officer.

This is the 19th year of the prize, which is kindly sponsored by the Worshipful Company of Poulters, who are long-standing friends and supporters of the Regiment. The Poulters have kindly invited Private Christopher Webb and his Commanding Officer to their Christmas Court Lunch in London, where they will formally present the prize.

The Regiment Bids a Fond Farewell to the Regimental Secretary



Our many thanks to Lieutenant Colonel Robert Goodin on his retirement as Regimental Secretary after 10 years in appointment. It is quite right that the Regimental Family owes a great debt of gratitude to Colonel Robert for his service at Regimental Headquarters following 35 years of regular service in the Regiment.

Robert's first joined the Regiment (The Vikings) in 1978 and his spent formative years in the Battalion in Northern Ireland, Belize, Germany and Gibraltar. Appointments outside Battalion included an instructor role at RMA Sandhurst, studying for a Master in Defence Administration at Shrivenham and attendance at the NATO Defence College in Rome. Robert also commanded the Steelbacks from 2004 – 2006, taking our 3rd Bn from the East of England Regiment to the organisation it is today. He played a significant part in development of Security Sector Reform in Iraq and Afghanistan. He was awarded MBE in 2002 and OBE in 2007.

Colonel Robert took over as Regimental Secretary in 2013 to run RHQ and its tasks of overseeing heritage, benevolence and veterans matters. Those who served with him in the Army will remember not only a very competent officer in and out of the field, but one with an infectious enthusiasm. It is this enthusiasm that he bought to RHQ. During his tenure he was involved with the introduction of the Regimental Website which will go live later this year and is a significant piece of work. The website will improve links and connectivity to many more members of our family, provide forums for discussion and information exchange, links to the museum and other aspects of our heritage and support networks. He also redeveloped the Regimental shop, introduced the Big Breakfast campaign, and contributed much for the 'Aden to Afghanistan' history of the Regiment. Most significant however is his focus and unsung expansion of support to our veterans, this endures as a priority for RHQ and no doubt many members of our family are thankful for the assistance they have received.

We salute Col Robert's forty five years of selfless commitment to the Royal Anglian family and we are all richer and better off for it. We wish Colonel Robert and Dominique all the best for the future and no doubt we will see them at many of the Regimental family gatherings for years to come.

1st Battalion (The Vikings)

The year finished as it had started for the Battalion - at full pelt. Our winter activity included the deployment of BHQ as a LOCON on Ex LAND WARRIOR, Anti-Tank Platoon exercising as part of a Finnish Brigade on Ex HAMMER, and the deployment of B Company to Bosnia as part of Op ELGIN.

Battalion HQ were tested in their first experience of CAST as a Security Force assistance (SFA) Headquarters on Ex LAND WARRIOR. Staff Officers and enablers were exercised in planning and execution as part of the Allied Response Force Land Component. The three week exercise in Warminster proved to be an exceptional opportunity in shaping the warfighting capability of an SFA battalion. I R Anglian were utilised heavily by I Div HQ in the initial phases of the operation, and the concept of preemptive SFA deployment with partner forces to shape the operating environment was thoroughly proved.

A composite II Brigade Anti-Tank Platoon (led by I R ANGLIAN) was deployed in November on Ex HAMMER, a Finnish Armoured Brigade exercise on the Russian border. This exercise was designed to test Finnish mobilisation efforts to counter aggression on the Eastern border, whilst also working to integrate partner NATO forces into their order of battle. Members of Anti-Tank Platoon weathered the near artic conditions of a Finnish Winter and navigated the large swathes of swamps and pine forests that make up most of Finland's hinterland. Despite these conditions, the Anti-Tank Platoon seamlessly integrated into the Finnish order of battle and provided a critical dismounted capability that could operate across complex terrain. Anti-Tank Platoon were also given an APC capability on Pasi 6x6 to enable large road moves and provide a reactive capability to the Finnish Brigade. Overall, the exercise was an excellent demonstration in how SFA sub-units can effectively partner with NATO forces and provide unique capabilities on the battlefield.

Back to the Balkans - B (Suffolk) Coy Proving the SFA Concept in Bosnia

B (Suffolk) Company were deployed to Bosnia and Herzegovina in November to provide a rapid capability that reinforced NATO's contribution to the region as the Strategic Reserve Force was deployed to neighbouring Kosovo. The deployment was initiated at short notice and was only made possible by reactive support from 1 R ANGLIAN enabling departments.



B Company were aligned to the 4th, 5th, 6th Brigades and Long Range Surveillance Group of the Bosnian Army for the duration of their deployment and delivered various types of basic fieldcraft and tactical lessons to their sub-units. There was also close cooperation with the ODA 9534, part of the 19th Special Forces Group of US SOCEUR and 4th SFAB, who were also in theatre to deliver train, advise and assist activity to Bosnian Army units. The exercise attracted Ministerial level attention and was the perfect example of rapidly deploying a tailored SFA capability to a partner nation in Europe.

This was the 10th Anniversary of the Freedom of the Town for the Royal Anglian Regiment.

Once changed into No2 Dress, CSgt Presland and I were shown into the Council's ante room to meet the guests and hosts. We were in good company! There was Simon, a veteran who served with the Bedfordshire & Hertfordshire Regiment. He was very interested on how the Regiment was doing and even more interested in D Company, 2 Royal Anglian, who maintain strong lineage back to the 'Beds and Herts'.

Next we were introduced to Baroness Taylor OBE, who herself was leader of Stevenage council in 2009. The Baroness has often spoken on Armed Forces issues in Parliament. We then had a cup of tea with Councillor Claire Parris, who is the Veterans champion, and the organiser of the event I was attending.

Introductions and brews finished, we were shown into the grand corridor where Mayor Myla Arceno was stood next to a large black frame, draped with a red cloth. Mayor Arceno made a speech and talked of the


Freedom being the highest honour bestowed by a Council, and the deep connection between the Royal Anglian Regt and the residents of Stevenage. The cloth was removed and the new Anglian Regiment flag was revealed.

Ex Mayor John Lloyd then unexpectedly whisked us both away to a quieter corner of the building to show us the large Welsh slate, engraved 10 years ago to celebrate the original granting of the freedom of Stevenage. The ceremony took place when he was the Mayor of Stevenage. Mayor Lloyd said it was a very proud moment in his career and he remembered the drums and flutes playing, as the Regiment marched by Colours, held high. Mayor Lloyd was a good character and immediately put us at ease, showing us down the long corridor of the 'rogues gallery' with portraits of the old Mayors of Stevenage and loudly declaring whether they were dead or not.

We ended up back in the ante room and sat with the veterans to enjoy lunch. A local amateur historian named Dave showed us his father's medals, and what his dad did during World War 2, in the BEF. We shared stories together, updated old members on how the Battalion was doing, and discussed what the battalion was doing next. As exciting as it always is speaking to the older veterans, whose stories I heard growing up and who probably influenced me joining the British Army, I was pleased to see much younger veterans in attendance too. These were veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan, and it shows that those veterans are appreciated and honoured within their local community.

Here's to another 10 years of the Freedom of the Town of Stevenage.



EX KRONUS HUNTER - 19 Light Brigade Potential Junior Non-Commissioned Officers Cadre 2023 - By SSgt (SSI) Waddell RAPTC

Ex KRONUS HUNTER is an example of how world events can change a whole course within just a few days. The PJNCO Cadre was due to take place in Cyprus, however, events in the middle east meant that Cyprus was cancelled and a new location had to be planned within a matter of days. Only the British Army has the resources and the capacity to pull such a task off. With some hard work from BHQ, help from Op INTERFLEX and a change of distance of nearly 2,000 miles, the course was now to be run at Langford Farm STANTA in Norfolk.

The PJNCO Cadre was given to 3 Royal Anglian to conduct, plan and execute as part of 19 Light Brigade's task providing reservists to support Op INTERFLEX. It created an opportunity for deployed Reservists to conduct a Cadre while supporting the Operation. Directing Staff, G4, G6, G7 and a real-life enemy force was pulled from BHQ, Permanent Staff and a large contingent from the Army Reserve Soldiers of the Battalion. With a quick change of the packing list, from the summer sleeping bag to the much-needed bouncing bomb. Seven Battalions within the brigade would be providing their best Private's to undertake the course and if successful become Lance Corporals.

With students coming from all over the UK, the initial phase of the cadre consisted of start standard tests in military knowledge and navigation theory. The three Section Commanders were fulfilled by SPSIs (CSgt Ash Ward, Sgt Dean Watts and Sgt Craig Davitt) who all come with years of military and operational experience. Their knowledge would be the best tool for the students in developing themselves to be a Section 2IC, through their excellent teaching. The Section Commanders invested many hours of the first few days of the course transforming the Army Reserve soldiers within their Section into a cadre frame of mind, and getting to know all the soldiers they were training individually. Some of these soldiers had only finished their civilian job hours before travelling and parading for the course.

As with all teaching courses, the Cadre moved back to basics and refresher lessons were taught to build the foundations for the students to develop further. With early morning starts the Section Commanders wanted to maximise the use of short-day light hours in the unsettling autumn weather. On the II November the course halted training for a short period, and formed a hollow square, to remember those soldiers who had paid the ultimate sacrifice.

The students began refining their leadership style in the attacks phase whilst now living in the field. Over the next few days each section was drilled relentlessly on the section attacks, before returning to their wet wood block which would be their home for five days. With the Section Commanders handing over their appointment of Section Commander to the students their eyes were now focused solely on the section 2IC appointment, with the DS grading the students command and control, and how the hopefuls dealt with pressure. They were observed by the Platoon Commander and Platoon Sgt while in the harbour area. For many of these students this would be the longest they had spent continuously in the field. They soon became familiar with harbour life, whilst continuing to learn and understand the importance of their development in the Section 2IC role.

The final part of the green phase of the exercise was an early morning Platoon Attack which would give every student the chance to show their DS that they had grasped complexities and demands of the Section 2IC appointment and would be able to return to their Battalion and be competent within this role. All the DS raised the tempo and pushed their Sections during the final part of the attack, making sure they performed at the highest level with grit, controlled aggression and the thought process required as a leader. ENDEX was called and with that 35 new newly qualified Privates were now eligible for promotion to Lance Corporal.

The final stage of the course was back to the dry (but not warm) Langford Farm to conduct their Army Leadership Development Programme. As Lance Corporals within the Army Reserves, these soldiers must be capable of effective leadership through command and management, be role models for their subordinates and contribute to team ethos and operational effectiveness.

For me, prior to any course, there's always a nervous anticipation due to wanting to do well. This was even more prevalent in preparation for this course which, would hopefully, lead to me earning my first stripe.

Considering the short notice move from Cyprus to the UK, the DS managed to create a course which had all the ingredients for a challenging and informative cadre. It was a true test of physical, mental and leadership performance and for anyone who said it wasn't difficult, clearly they were not putting all their effort in.

The Course was a packed and had a relentless pace which I think is important for me as a Reserve Soldier as it doesn't give me time to worry about the stresses of civilian life (a form of respite almost!) and allows me to get my head in the game. I've learned so much, sharpened so many existing skills and have come away feeling a real sense of achievement.

For me, nothing beats seeing a Section/Platoon of individuals you mostly don't know, flourish into a team with such a strong cohesion, and new friendships formed which will last a lifetime. Everyone had each other's backs and were there to drag each other through the hard times, pushing them to new limits they didn't think were possible.

I'm really excited to put the skills I've honed to good use to set an example, teach, and help subordinates and others around me, to operate effectively.

Our Regimental Heritage



The 7th Battalion, Queen's Colour Returns to Leicester

New Colours were presented to the 7th (Volunteer) Battalion of the Regiment by HRH Princess Alice, Duchess of Gloucester, on 20 April 1980 in Leicester, where the Battalion Headquarters was based.



In December 2021 Leicester Cathedral was closed for two years for a major refurbishment, including some repairs and rebuilding, installing under-floor heating and complete redecoration. All its contents therefore had to be removed and stored. This obviously included all the Colours, which were carefully taken to a conservation company in Stamford, so the opportunity was therefore taken for the 7 R ANGLIAN Queen's Colour to be netted to increase the length of its life.

On 22 November 2023 all the Colours were returned to Leicester Cathedral and rehung on the same wall of the Royal Leicestershire Regimental Chapel as previously, before the Cathedral's first service on 26 November, presided over by the Rt Rev Martyn Snow, Bishop of Leicester.

Some more building work will continue until about June 2024, but the smart redecorated Cathedral is now open as usual for services and visits. Any member of the Regiment would be very welcome to visit it to see the Colour (and King Richard III's tomb!).

The 2/5 Essex Regiment at El Alamein

My name is David Page, In my retirement I pursue military history, often involving the British-Indian Army in WW2.

In May 2023 I discovered the battle on 1st July 1942 at Deir el Shein, a depression, eight miles south of El Alamein, Egypt, when the German Afrika Korps found the 2/5th Essex, part of the 18th Indian Infantry Brigade, in a hastily prepared defensive position – often called a Box.



The brigade was overwhelmed and the 2/5th suffered heavy casualties, the majority being taken prisoner – many till liberation in 1945 – and a dozen are commemorated on the El Alamein Memorial. The battle forms part of 'The First Battle of El Alamein', which is often overlooked by historians.

A 'Battle Honour' for the action was awarded to the Essex Regiment and several medals awarded.

My focus is what happened that day. The big gap for the 2/5th is how many were wounded, taken prisoner and died that day – whose graves were never located as Deir el Shein was bombarded and fought over afterwards.

I know how they reached Deir el Shein, but lack unofficial, maybe private memoirs of that time. There are some in libraries, online and in 'The Eagle' about being a prisoner.

I have assembled a mass of information, from back issues of 'The Eagle', online resources, official records and a few memoirs. Two libraries remain to be visited (another has been hit by a cyber-attack).

Can anyone help? Or do you have access to individual memoirs?

About the band

The Band is an Army Reserve Band and provides musical support for various charities and support to the Royal Anglian Regiment its Association.

The first trace of a Band, paid for by public expense, within the Northamptonshire Regiment was recorded in 1798 when Thomas Hewitt of the 48th reported that "approval was given for six boys to be enlisted in the 48th for the band, and at the same time a German bandmaster was engaged", a normal procedure at this time.

In 1996 the 5th Battalion of the Royal Anglian Regiment was re-roled as 158 (Royal Anglian) Tpt Regt RLC but the regimental Council elected to keep the Band, which were renamed Band of the Royal Anglian Regiment (TA) following the amalgamation of the Regular Royal Anglian bands into the Bands of the Queen's Division.
